SJBAS Monthly Meeting Notes – March 8, 2017

Submitted by Jill Tripp Attendance: 38 (It was Spring Break for FLC, so that may have influenced the attendance.)

A pre-meeting social was held in the foyer of the Southwest Center, then President Janice Sheftel opened the meeting with a welcome to all, and explained that we would have a few brief announcements, then our program, followed by a business meeting to discuss the results of the membership survey. Shelby Tisdale invited everyone to the Center of SW Studies lecture series, which includes her talk on March 15th on “Three Generations of Santa Clara Pueblo Painters: Pablita, Helen, and Margarete.” Shelby also announced that the Center’s April program was postponed until June. Janice then gave a big “thank you” to Susan Livenick for stepping up to be our volunteer coordinator.

Janice then introduced our speaker Connie Massingale, who gave a very informative talk on “Plant Uses of Prehistoric Peoples”, accompanied by beautiful photos of the many plants she discussed, and which were used for food, shelter, clothing and medicine. For more information, Connie recommended the book *Wild Plants and Native Peoples of the Four Corners* by Dunmire and Tierney. Connie then presented her exquisite PowerPoint on “Archaeology of Cedar Mesa”.

Janice gave a brief review of the membership survey results. She thanked Barb and Fokie for compiling the results of the 46 surveys that were returned. The survey was to help guide the board in planning for future programs and activities, and indicated that field trips and the monthly speakers are important to our members. Education is also important, and more information will be forthcoming regarding the PAAC program, as the new director is in the process of revamping the classes. Janice explained that we are getting a legal opinion as far as our ability as a nonprofit organization to advocate on certain issues. She also explained that the board will be examining the relationship of SJBAS with CAS (Colorado Archaeological Society), our parent organization, in light of survey results which showed that many of our members do not read CAS publications or participate in CAS-sponsored activities. Janice mentioned that to keep our members informed, a summary of future board meetings will be in the Moki, and a discussion of all the information available on the website will be presented again, for those who missed it at the annual meeting (holiday party). She emphasized that the board listened to what people said, and is trying to respond accordingly, and encouraged anyone with questions or comments to contact any board member as it was getting too late for further discussion. The meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM.

SJBAS is honored to be having several noted speakers from away from our area in the upcoming months. Dr. Doug Owsley, a world renowned physical anthropologist, Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institution, will be our speaker at a special event on the evening of Friday, September 15, 2017, in the FLC Ballroom, following an informal reception in that room. He will speak on his forensic anthropological work at colonial Jamestown. Mark your calendars. Doug was the keynote speaker at the CAS Annual conference held in Durango in October 2015. His talk on Kennewick Man was roundly applauded. We enjoyed his presentation so much and he really enjoyed us, so he was willing to return. The event will be co-sponsored by the FLC Lifelong Learning (LLL) Program and the Department of Anthropology.
