Janice Sheftel, President, opened the meeting at 7:00 PM. Janice welcomed members and visitors and then opened the meeting for announcements:

- The club will meet for a picnic at the home of Foxie & Richard Mason in June in lieu of a meeting at the Center of Southwest Studies. Please RSVP to Foxie or you can sign up on the sheet being circulated.
- A used book sale will be held in conjunction with the picnic this year. Please bring used books to the picnic to donate for the auction.
- SJBAS is a co-sponsor for the Four Corners Lecture Series this year. As such, both the July & August SJBAS meetings will serve as two of the lectures in the series and a reception will be held before each of the two meetings beginning at 6:00 p.m.

Puye Cliff Dwellings and Bandelier National Monument Field Trip Report – by Lyle Hancock

Twelve SJBAS members met at Santa Rita Park on a rainy Monday morning and drove to Espanola, New Mexico where we stopped for a delicious lunch at La Cocina Restaurant. The first official stop on the field trip was Puye Cliff Dwellings, a National Historic Landmark and the ancestral home of today's Santa Clara Pueblo people. By the time we got there, the skies had cleared and we had fantastic weather for the remainder of the trip. We toured the original Harvey House bed and breakfast built at the beginning of the 20th century and Puye Cliff Dwellings museum while waiting for our tour to begin. Sam, an elder of the Santa Clara Pueblo, was our guide. He spent part of his childhood living at the cliff dwellings, as his father was in charge of maintenance for a number of years. It addition to being an interesting fellow with many stories to tell, Sam possessed a wealth of



knowledge about the cliff dwellings and the Santa Clara Pueblo people. Our two-hour tour turned into a three-hour tour, and we learned a lot. There were a number of cavates (cave rooms carved into the soft volcanic tuff cliffs) to explore, many petroglyphs, several ladders to climb, and a fun hike to the top of the mesa where the walls of the excavated pueblo are still standing. After our tour we drove to Bandelier National Monument, set up camp at the group campsite in the Juniper Campground, and enjoyed a late happy hour under clear skies.



camp in time for a leisurely afternoon and happy hour.

On Tuesday morning most of the group hiked directly from the campground into Frijoles Canyon on the Frey Trail. This scenic trail provided the first access into the canyon before the roads were built. We checked in at the visitor center and then walked the main trail through Tyuonyi Pueblo and along the cliffs where numerous cavates were located. The most closely related descendants of these ancient pueblo people now live at Cochiti Pueblo, located south of Bandelier along the Ro Grande. We hiked another mile up the canyon and climbed 140 feet of ladders to reach the spectacular Alcove site and kiva. Fires in the drainage above the monument caused major flooding in 2011 and the effects were still quite evident today. Later we toured the museum, watched a film, and hiked 1.5 miles to the Upper Falls. We returned to

On Wednesday, we broke camp and headed to an outlier site of Bandelier known as Tsankawi Village. The most closely related descendants of this pueblo now live nearby at San Ildefonso Pueblo, located just to the east along the Rio Grande. We hiked the 1.5-mile loop trail that took us to the pueblo ruins on top of the mesa and along the cliff sides where there were numerous cavates and petroglyphs. There were several ladders to negotiate and many extremely narrow trails beaten into the soft volcanic tuff. Then we drove to Ojo Caliente Hot Springs Resort where we had lunch. After lunch we hiked about a mile to Posi-ouinge, a large P-IV pueblo ruin on a low mesa right above the hot springs and Ojo Caliente River. Clearly arranged large rubble mounds, some kiva depressions, and many potsherds were most



visible. The descendants of this pueblo now reside at San Juan Pueblo. After exploring this site everyone headed back to Durango and arrived safely home before dark.

1873 - the year that two guns that "won the west" were introduced, the Colt Single Action Army and Winchester Model 1873. As depicted in fact and fiction, firearm manufacturing and expertise came of age when Western expansion was at its peak, transforming the United States from an isolated agricultural nation into the world's leading industrial and military power. Richardson is the author of *Colt: The Revolver of the American West* (Rizzoli, 2013). He has appeared as an expert commentator of numerous shows, including *Pawn Stars, Mysteries at the Museum*, and *History Detectives*.
