SJBAS Annual Meeting Report – December 8th

Our annual meeting was held in conjunction with our holiday party. After dinner, Janice officially closed the bidding for the Silent Auction, convened the annual meeting, and announced the winners of several door prizes. Mark Gebhardt, SJBAS treasurer, presented Shelby Tisdale, director of the Center of Southwest Studies, a \$500 check from the John W. Sanders Internship Fund and presented an annual review of SJBAS finances. Mark explained that our society is on firm financial footing and that the John W. Sanders Internship Fund is doing well. Janice thanked Peggy Morris for her many years of volunteer service conducting silent auctions and raising thousands of dollars for the Internship Fund.

President Obama Designates Bears Ears National Monument

President Barack Obama designated two national monuments Wednesday at sites in Utah and Nevada that have become flashpoints over use of public land in the West, marking the administration's latest move to protect environmentally sensitive areas in its final days. The Bears Ears National Monument in Utah will cover 1.35 million acres in the Four Corners, the White House said. In a victory for Native American tribes and conservationists, the designation protects land that is considered sacred and is home to an estimated 100,000 archaeological sites, including ancient cliff dwellings. – Durango Herald (<u>Read article</u>)

Celebrating a Mammoth Dust-up in Bluff

In the early 1990s, after assisting Crow Canyon Archaeological Center researchers in recording the Sand Island rock art site near Bluff, Utah, local artist Joe Pachak made a mammoth discovery. He'd spotted what he believed to be a petroglyph depicting a Columbian mammoth, one of two species of wooly mammoth formerly endemic to North America and arguably the older of the two, superimposed with what also appeared to be a Pleistocene bison. - Archaeology Southwest blog (<u>Read article</u>)

New Podcast for Mesa Verde Region Archaeology

Visitors to Montezuma County may get a podcast tour guide when they explore archaeological sites next year. The Mesa Verde Country Visitor Information Bureau received \$25,000 through a marketing matching-grant program. Kelly Kirkpatrick, director of tourism, plans to use the money to create podcasts to help visitors learn about the area's rich archaeological history. – Durango Herald (<u>Read article</u>)

Public Gets a Look at the Paths to Mesa Verde Planning

More than 50 people crowded the Mancos Town Hall on the night of Dec. 15 for the first public outreach meeting on the Paths to Mesa Verde Trail. The proposal is a 17-mile, multiuse trail between Cortez and Mancos, stopping at the Montezuma County Fairgrounds, Phil's World, Mesa Verde National Park and other locations along the way. In January, the project made Gov. John Hickenlooper's "16 in 16" list of highest-priority trail ideas across the state. – Cortez Journal (<u>Read article</u>)
