# Next SJBAS Meeting - November 8th

The next SJBAS meeting will be held on Wednesday, November 8<sup>th</sup>, at 7:00 p.m. in the Lyceum at the Center of Southwest Studies at Fort Lewis College. After a brief business meeting, Wayne Lorenz, P.E. will present: "Ancient Pompeii – Archaeological Features of Water Systems." A social will be held before the meeting at 6:30 p.m. in the CSWS foyer.

There are fascinating archaeological features of the water systems that the ancient Romans built to serve Pompeii and the communities around the Naples Bay, Italy. One of the largest aqueduct systems in the

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Roman Empire was constructed in the first century B.C. to serve these communities. In this presentation, major aspects of the 62-mile long aqueduct called the Aqua Augusta will be presented. Learn about water use inside the City of Pompeii where the elite inhabitants had water plumbed into their houses. Water was on display in some exciting ways that have been preserved. The workings of the water system and photographs of how the water was displayed will be highlighted in this presentation.

Wayne F. Lorenz, P.E. is Chief Engineer of Wright Water Engineers, Inc. He also is the Director of Roman Aqueduct Studies for the Wright Paleohydrological Institute and has supervised six field research visits to Pompeii. Lorenz has published the results of his Roman water engineering research in many journals.

#### Indigenous knowledge untangles the mystery of Mesa Verde – High Country News 10/02/2017

Generations of Tewa storytellers have kept the history of the Pueblo Revolt alive, whispered and sung in a language that invading Europeans couldn't understand. They repeated stories of the revolt the same way they repeated even older stories, ones that told of their great migration from the north and the formation of Tewa clans.

Growing up in Ohkay Owingeh, Arthur Cruz heard these stories. He learned the songs. They helped shape his identity. And now, they're helping reshape scientists' understanding of the pulse of human life across the Southwest. Combined with new data analyses and a multidisciplinary approach that incorporates linguistics, genetics and other fields, archaeologists working closely with Pueblo people like Cruz have begun to fill in the gaps of migration patterns that have long puzzled Western scientists. The story that's emerging is a testament to the resilience of culture — and the scientific value of Indigenous knowledge. (Read article)

#### Yucca House Public Access – Durango Herald 9/25/2017

Montezuma County Commissioners agreed to support a land donation to Yucca House National Monument, so the public access point can be relocated off a rancher's land. Tourist traffic and parking have interfered with his farming operations. Bernard and Nancy Karwick offered to give the National Park Service 16 acres adjacent to Yucca House, allowing the new access point.

#### Oil Rigs at Hovenweep – Durango Herald

New drilling rigs and oil and gas infrastructure could sprout within sight of Hovenweep National Monument, according to a proposed March lease sale issued by a Utah office of the Bureau of Land Management. An environmental analysis released Sept. 22 proposes to lease 51,400 acres of federal minerals in southeastern Utah for possible oil and gas development. The proposal includes 43 parcels in Grand and San Juan counties. They include parcels 50 and 51, totaling 2,665 acres, on the eastern Utah border, north and west of Hovenweep National Monument archaeological sites in Colorado and Utah. (Read article)

#### BLM Plans to Lease Archaeologically Sensitive Areas of Southern Utah - Salt Lake Tribune

The Bureau of Land Management plans to move forward on nearly 52,000 acres of proposed oil and gas leases in archaeologically sensitive parts of southeastern Utah. Among the 43 parcels to be auctioned in March are several that span Recapture and Jenny canyons, Mustang Mesa, Alkali Ridge and Montezuma Creek — all spots harboring a rich record of Ancestral Puebloan habitation dating back centuries, according to an environmental review released on Friday. Under an achingly blue sky, a lanky cowboy squints into the sun's haze as he scans the plain. The scene feels frontier fresh, like it could have been plucked from the 1880s.
