# Trip Report: Goodman Point and Sand Canyon Pueblos

April 29th was a great day to enjoy the beautiful vistas out on the Great Sage Plain. Kurt Hillman and Rusty Chamberlain met at Rusty's house and motored through Cortez headed to our first site, Goodman Point Pueblo. Before we reached the site, we encountered a detour. Rusty added excitement to the trip with a wrong turn, which led to an impassable, steep and rutted track. But we did get to see some interesting terrain. After getting back on track, we arrived at the parking lot for Goodman Point Pueblo.

Goodman Point Pueblo was set aside as an archaeological resource in 1889 and is a unit of Hovenweep National Monument. Because of its early protection, the pueblo and the surrounding land have been untouched by agriculture. The path to the pueblo is an easy level walk which ends at the canyon wall. From there we could see structures on the other side.

We then traveled west to Sand Canyon trail head. At the parking lot, hikers can go left and hike down to McElmo Creek and County Rd G or right through mixed forest to the pueblo. Veering right took us to the head of the deep side canyon with the pueblo built along both sides. This site has a well-marked trail with interpretive signage along the way. Like Goodman Point, the pueblo had rock walls that enclosed it on both sides. We hiked along the wall then crossed it to a plaza inside the village. We followed the path through the village to the canyon, pausing at signs that explained the results of excavation. The signs pointed out architectural features such as the double walled D-shaped building and the Great Kiva. One sign discussed the differences between the larger neighborhood on right and that on the left. This difference is an example of dual moiety or two groups living together but separated by a barrier, lineage, social status or function.

The path ended at the canyon edge. From here we could see how the structures on the left side of the canyon had been built down the steep side. To get there we had to back track and pick up the path that goes around the smaller left side of the of the town. Again, several more signs to help explain researchers' interpretation of the site. We walked to the end of canyon on this side and looking down we saw remnants of walls. On one boulder we spotted what appeared to be a Hovenweep-like structure perched on a boulder.

Back at the trail head, we enjoyed our lunch at a table in the shade. It was fun to share our histories and our thoughts on these two sites. Both sites make an easy half-day trip that can be combined with a visit to Lowry Pueblo or Canyon of The Ancients Visitor Center for a full day of archaeological adventure. –Rusty Chamberlain

#### **Briefs**

New Stamp Honors Chief Standing Bear for Civil Rights Achievements. **Petroglyphs National Monument Shrinks Trail System by 70%.** In response to years of visitor-caused damage PNM's trail system will drop from 140 miles to 39. Thirty *unofficial* access points will also be closed. The decision was made after years of damage to the site caused by off-leash dogs, people not picking up dog poop, littering and illegal dumping.
