
Annual New Member Orientation

First Field Trip of 2024: Backroom tour of Canyon of the Ancients Visitor Center and Museum

As a follow-up to the fall field trip to the Cannonball Ruins, a trip was undertaken to view the recovered artifacts housed at the Canyon of the Ancients Visitor Center and Museum. Blythe Morrison, curator for the collections, led 12 of us on an in-depth backroom tour. The museum and curation facility were built to house the artifacts discovered during the construction of the





McPhee Reservoir and the Dolores Lateral Canals. This is a federal facility owned by the Bureau of Land Management, one of only three such BLM facilities in the country. It houses artifacts from permitted excavation sites in western Colorado. Its's mission is to share with the public and host researchers.

Blythe explained how the artifacts are processed (after being accepted at the facility), as she led us deeper and deeper into a maze of rooms under the museum. Currently the facility houses over 4 million artifacts. Cannonball Ruins were inhabited from 1140 AD until 1300 AD. The architectural and construction methods resemble the Hovenweep style. This site also exemplifies the trend in the McElmo drainage of building settlements on canyon rims. The site was first excavated by Sylvanus Morley in 1908. His report is available online. Blythe had pulled several examples of artifacts from storage to show us, as well as pointing out artifacts on display in the museum. See photos below. Students from Ignacio High School Zoom into January SJBAS Lucy Talk. Gifted and Talented instructor Crystal Redman alerted her class to the SJBAS talk on Lucy. She told Moki that her class is currently working through a six-week evolution unit. She said, "Last week, we were looking at evolutionary history and relationships and the fossil record." The talk was so intriguing and appropriate that she made the presentation required for the "gifted and talented" students to attend and produce two-page summaries of their learnings.

Redman added that she "enjoyed the presentation very much and didn't really think about this kind of evidence being available by looking at a fossil. It certainly humanized Lucy for me. Now that I know about your organization, I hope to incorporate future presentations into my curriculum."

SJBAS Trip opportunity? Last year President Biden created Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni – Ancestral Footprints of the Grand Canyon National Monument. The designation protects 900,000 acres of canyons, plateaus and indigenous culture near Grand Canyon National Park. It includes more than 3,000 historic and cultural sites. The Monument will be co-managed by the National Forest Service, the BLM and in consultation with area tribes. Visiting the new monument easily classifies as roughing it as there is no visitors center yet or even pit toilets. You'll see just a lot of uncrowded, astonishing landscape and pre-contact indigenous cultural sites.
