Briefs

Beyond Yucca and Animal Skins

The Four Corners may have had cotton centuries earlier than previously believed. Researchers at Crow Canyon announced they have dated cotton pollen grains from about 750-950 AD. This finding pushes back by at least a couple of hundred years the oldest known Southwest pollen grains. Researchers emphasize that the discovery doesn't mean cotton was necessarily grown here; just that the grains hitched a ride on cotton garments. Plans for managing Bears Ears

<u>The Salt Lake Tribune</u> offers a good overview of what's ahead for the shape-shifting monument. The draft plan includes five alternate roadmaps for co-managing the Monument by Indigenous tribes, the BLM and the National Forest Service. The government's preferred plan allows for some grazing but no recreational shooting. It would also limit off-highway vehicle use but not eliminate it. There would be no new mining permits issued.
