SJBAS Monthly Meeting: August 14

President's Message

"Good news, we have received another permit for Lyle's fall Bears Ears trip. Hopefully this process will become routine. See the trip calendar at SJBAS.ORG for sign up information.

Dr. Andy Gulliford gave an interesting presentation in July on "National Conservation Areas" as a means of preserving significant historical and archaeological sites. A primary difference is NCAs are solely established by an act of congress, not Presidential proclamation as with National Monuments. National Monuments



can either be established by the US Congress though legislation or by the president through the use of the Antiquities Act. Modification of NCA boundaries requires an act of congress which must pass through the legislative process rather than simple proclamation.

In related news, Project 2025 has proposals that could impact preservation of archaeological sites throughout the West. These include proposals to review national monument designations with an

eye to reducing their size (p. 532). Another significant proposal is to seek repeal of the Antiquities Act of 1906 (p. 532) and restoration of mining claims and oil and gas leases in the 10-mile buffer around Chaco Cultural Historic National Park. More information can be found here.

Hunter and I gave a presentation at the Pine River Library about archaeology. Participants received an overview of SJBAS and the science of archaeology. This included stratigraphy, archaeological context, and dating methods. Handouts included site visit etiquette and a general guideline to artifact collection regulations and what to do if significant artifacts or human remains are discovered. Hunter presented a PowerPoint on La Plata County area archaeology. This was followed by hands-on activity that included atlatl



throws, knapping, fire drill, yucca twine and glue manufacturing. One participant indicated they would join and we received a donation from the library which will be applied to the Sanders fund."—*Paul Landrum*

Briefs

BLM and Forest Service to host Bears Ears Advisory Committee meeting. The meeting on August 8 will be in Monticello but also offered virtually. It follows a field tour of the monument the previous day by the advisory committee. The field tour is open to the public but attendees must provide their own transportation. You can learn more here.

Support Overwhelming for Indigenous Co-Management of Bears Ears

With the BLM public comment period ending in mid-June, results show strong support for "the use of Traditional Indigenous Knowledge in the management of the monument." Comments came from over 20,000 people. You may read more at <u>Native News Online</u>.

Astronomer transforms ideas about dating archaeological sites-- and climate. AE Douglass pioneered the use of tree rings a century ago to date archaeological sites. An *article in Arizona Highways* revisits his groundbreaking work and how it was ignored when creating the Colorado River Compact.

GOP Project 2025 Seeks Repeal of Antiquities Act. This roadmap for a new Republican administration aims to shrink government in many ways. One is to eliminate the power of the president to create national monuments without congressional approval. It's easy to surmise that the driving force for this scheme is prevent any more Bears Ears.
