Finally, an interesting article is in the current issue of "*Archaeology*" found on the second floor, periodicals section, of the Durango Public Library. It is titled "Birds of a Feather, Birds of Power" and explores the symbolism of ducks in basket maker rock art. Possible interpretations are supported by oral histories found in current pueblo societies and are included in the analysis. Petroglyphs from various sites in the region, including those found in Bears Ears, are discussed.

SJBAS Contingent Attends 2025 Pecos Conference in Bears Ears

The Pecos Conference, which rotates its annual venue throughout the Southwest, was hosted by the Bears Ears Partnership just outside Blanding, Utah. The theme this year was Bears Ears and adjacent "Lands Between." The Between being lands between Bears Ears and Canyons of the Ancients National Monument. The conference was 7-11 August.





The conference began Thursday evening with

registration and a reception at Edge of the Cedars Museum in Blanding. As those who have attended in the

past are aware, the Pecos Conference is known for its bigtent approach. Several of them, in fact. One tent is for talks, panel discussions,



meetings, and for the Saturday dinner and dance. The other tent is for vendors, the silent auction, poster displays, and some times, for meals.

The presentations began on Friday, blessed by FLC professor Chuck Riggs playing bagpipes. The speaker format has presenters each given 15 minutes in their area of research. ample, the conversations were great. The band was good and loud and went on until midnight, or so we heard. We, however, returned to the B&B in Blanding.


